Executive Summary


The data within this report reflects cases with incident dates from January 1, 2010 through December 15, 2010. This report provides an overview of cases resulting from alleged violations of the University of Georgia (UGA) Code of Conduct. While the majority of cases were managed by the Office of Student Conduct (OSC), University Housing data is also included. The following are highlights from the report.

- OSC received 1,257 cases during the 2010 calendar year. The majority of cases originated from Housing, Athens Clarke County Police, UGA Police Department, and University Computer Services (EITS/InfoSec).
- OSC resolved 938 cases as compared to 298 resolved through the Department of Housing.
- University conduct officers resolved 73% (n=906) of the cases informally, while students elected to resolve cases through the formal hearing process at a rate of 8% (n=100).
- There were a total of 2,121 alleged violations during the 2010 calendar year.
- Males (n=787) were more likely than females (n=449) to face allegations of violations.
- Related to alcohol and other drugs, freshmen make up the majority of students allegedly violating the Code of Conduct related to Regulation 4, at a rate of 60% (n=604).
- The most common assigned sanction was University probation (618), followed closely by mandated alcohol education classes (n=564) through the Fontaine Center or a court-approved facility.
- During the 2010 calendar year, 67 students were suspended from the University.
- There were a total of 17 appeals for the 2010 calendar year.
- OSC processed 4,442 Dean's Certifications.

2010 Case Origination


"Incidents of alleged violations of conduct regulations are reported to the Director for Student Conduct, Office of Student Conduct (500 Memorial Hall) or a designee. Individuals or groups filing a report should do so in writing and the report should be submitted as soon as possible after the alleged violation. Reports not submitted in writing will be independently verified prior to beginning a conduct investigation. For individuals filing a report, a meeting can be arranged with a staff member in the Office of Student Conduct to discuss the conduct process. For incidents to be reported in University Housing, individuals or groups filing a report may contact the Area Office where the incident took place" (The University of Georgia Code of Conduct, 2010).

OSC receives reports of alleged violations of conduct regulations from a variety of sources. Unless suspension or expulsion are possible sanctions, incidents reported by University Housing personnel are often heard by University Housing staff. Housing and the ACC Police Department provided the majority of reports to OSC for the 2010 calendar year.




2010 Conduct Officer

"After receiving a report, a staff member will be assigned to investigate the circumstances of the incident and determine what conduct regulations, if any, are alleged to have been violated" (The University of Georgia Code of Conduct, 2010).



2010 Analysis of Resolution

"During the meeting the staff member will determine which, if any, of the alleged charges are to be resolved through the conduct process and advise the student or organization about the options for resolving conduct charges. There are two available options from which the student or organization can choose: (1) informal resolution, or (2) formal resolution (hearing) " (The University of Georgia Code of Conduct, 2010).



2010 Analysis by Gender









2010 Appeals

"The student or organization may appeal the decision from a formal judicial hearing. Appeal information will be included with the decision issued to a student or organization. Appeal forms are available in OSC. All appeals must be in writing and submitted to OSC within five (5) University business days of receipt of the decision. The purpose of appeal procedures is to provide the student with the opportunity to bring forward questions regarding substantive or procedural errors that occurred during the process. The appeal process is not intended to grant a new hearing at a higher level. Dissatisfaction with a decision is not grounds for an appeal" (The University of Georgia Code of Conduct, 2010).
